LEGACY PROJECT

The September edition of Good Neighbour included a number of pictures from inside the new annexe. Since then, things have moved on significantly. Those who regularly pass the site may not have noticed many changes over the past couple of months, but work inside the annexe has continued at pace. The electrical wiring and plumbing have been installed, many of the internal walls are now lined and insulated and acoustic panels are being installed to ensure a good quality of sound within the building



The annexe will have under-floor heating and the next major step is to lay that, after which a screed is poured which provides a smooth level base for the flooring. It is also hoped that, over the next few weeks, the coverings on the wall at the manse side of the church where the new doors are being knocked through will be removed.

The external paths have been tricky for many people and unfortunately this will continue up to very close to the end of the construction. Landscaping is always close to the last work to be carried out.

The budget is, of course, of prime importance and so far the project remains on budget with an estimated completion of end March 2026.

Up to this point a great deal of effort has inevitably been expended on property related matters. This is quite understandable as we work towards creating the physical infrastructure we need for the future.

However, as we move into the final four months of the build period, we now need to turn our attention to maximising the use of what will have been created. By the early summer of 2026 we should be almost ready with a fully functioning, purpose designed facility. We will need folk who will accept the challenge of taking the project to the next level.

At its last Session meeting, the Session was thinking about this and used the words of a very familiar hymn as an inspiration, challenge and structure for its thinking. The hymn was **Let us build a house where love can dwell**. The verses of that hymn include these words, built of hopes and dreams and vision, where the cross shall stand as witness and the symbol of God's grace, a house where hands will reach beyond the wood and stone and live the Word we've known. And it ends with the words, let this house proclaim from floor to rafter all are welcome, all are welcome in this place.

That really captures the vision behind our Legacy project.

Stop Press!

The source of power for our new annexe heating will be an air source heat pump. This is good for the environment and should mean more reasonable energy costs. We have been chasing a grant from The Scottish Government's Community and Renewable Energy Scheme (CARES) to help with the cost of this and have recently heard that we have been awarded a grant of £31,644. Well done to Diane Adam for all the work she did on this application.


In the Netherlands, a parade is held at the beginning of December to honour St Nicholas or Sinterklass


THE LEGEND OF ST NICHOLAS

Did you know that in the Dutch language, the name Santa Claus or Sinterklaas means St. Nicholas? Long, long ago, there really was a St. Nicholas who lived in the country we now call Turkey. When Nicholas grew up, he became a bishop who helped many people come to know and love Jesus. Bishop Nicholas was a kind man. He healed the sick and saved people from drowning after a shipwreck. Instead of sending thieves to jail, he talked them into returning the things they had stolen.

Legend has it that Nicholas heard about a poor man with three daughters. The man had no money to give his daughters so that they could be married. The man was worried that his poor daughters would have no one to love and care for them. One night Bishop Nicholas put some gold coins in a small bag and threw the bag of money through an open window of the man's house. Then he ran away. The family rejoiced when they found the money, and soon the oldest daughter was married. A short time later, Nicholas again made a secret visit to the poor man's house and left another bag of money. The family rejoiced again and used the money to help the second-oldest daughter get married.

The poor man began looking out his window every night. He wanted to thank the person who was saving his daughters from lives of loneliness and poverty. After a few weeks, Bishop Nicholas brought one last bag of gold to the house. But before Bishop Nicholas could run away, the poor man saw him, caught up with him, and thanked him again and again. The man told everyone he saw about Bishop Nicholas' generosity. St. Nicholas shared the gift of love, friendship and generosity and we should do the same. This Christmas and all year round remember how St Nicholas showed his love for Jesus, our Saviour, by sharing these gifts with family and friends and those who need help.

DID YOU KNOW?

Boxing Day is actually about boxes

It was traditionally a day when servants had the day off to visit their families. Their employees would send them home with "Christmas boxes" containing money, gifts or food to thank them for their reliable service throughout the past year.

Xmas doesn't take Christ out of Christmas

In fact "X" comes from the Greek letter "chi" which happens to be the first letter of the Greek word for Christ (Χριστός), and Greek was the original language of the New Testament. The word was simply created as an abbreviation and was first used in the mid 1500s.

Christmas was banned in Britain!

About 350 years ago, the Puritans, who'd come to power after they got rid of of King Charles I, thought there was too much eating, drinking and fun and enjoyment at Christmas. So, they banned it – much to the annoyance of the people who promptly rioted. As one person put it, 'Thus are the merry lords of misrule suppressed by the mad lords of bad rule at Westminster.' The ban lasted until King Charles II came back as ruler in 1660.

The Nativity Scene was invented by St Francis of Assisi

Showing the birth of Jesus in the stable with Mary, Joseph, shepherds, wise men, angels and all the animals using real people, statues or models is a tradition first thought up by St Francis of Assisi 800 years ago. Very few people could read the Bible and St Francis created the scene of Jesus' birth using straw and real animals so that people could worship him too and feel like what it was to be there that first Christmas.

Jingle Bells was the first song broadcast from space

History was made on 16th December 1965 when a song was broadcast from space for the first time. It happened on board NASA's Gemini 6A spacecraft when astronauts Wally Schirra and Thomas P. Stafford told Mission Control that they could see an unidentified object 'probably in polar orbit' piloted by someone 'wearing a red suit'. They then started playing Jingle Bells on a harmonica and a set of tiny sleigh bells which they'd smuggled on board.

CLARKSTON COMMUNITY CHOIR


