

It is always difficult to look ahead in a time of change, and I am conscious of that as I write. What is clear, however, is there will be challenges ahead for all of us. Together with one another in this congregation, perhaps in a formal union with Busby Church, with others in the Presbytery of Glasgow, and across Scotland, we may find God at work where we least expect it.



It is good at such a time to remember that God has a wide vision that goes far beyond our organisations and governing structures and that Jesus urged a broad vision that recognises the Holy Spirit is at work in the wider world. It is my strong belief that we are to have such a wide vision too in all we seek to do as we engage in the changes that are ahead for us. That is just one of the reasons that I feel blessed to be here with you at Greenbank where there is such a warm welcome offered to all people and where the mission of the church reflects God's love for all. It will be for us going forward to be caught up in that and that is what will continue the life and vitality of this place which is a precious spiritual home to so many.

His goal was the transformation of whole lives and whole situations. He usually left people with a decision to make about whether to follow or not.

My friends, our mission and ministry to others, in our individual lives and in our shared life as a church, will always demand our all. I hope that you draw strength from the knowledge that God always gives us all that we need, including the company of good people around us. We learn from how Jesus ministered to others and our focus must always be what will best serve God's way of love for all.

WINTER OLYMPICS 2026



The 2026 Winter Olympics, officially known as Milano Cortina 2026, will be held in Milan and Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy, from 6th February to 22nd February, featuring 116 medal events across 16 disciplines with around 3,500 athletes from ninety countries expected to compete. We all know about skiing and ice skating but one competition has a very unusual name and you would probably never be able to guess what people did in this sport from its name. It's the Skeleton!

Skeleton is one of the oldest winter sports. It began in the late 19th century in St. Moritz, Switzerland. Athletes compete by sliding down an ice track lying flat, face down on a small sled. The sport is known for its high speeds, with competitors reaching up to 130-140 km/h. Unlike luge, where athletes lie on their backs, skeleton racers tackle the track head-first, which adds to the excitement and danger of the sport. So if it snows during February, don't try this out. The competitor in the picture is wearing a lot of padding and crash helmet!


NATIONAL NUTELLA DAY

I imagine this is another Day you didn't know about but if you like Nutella here's an excuse to eat even more of it. This celebration, held on **5th February** each year started in 2007 when *massive* Nutella fan Sara Rosso decided that there should be a day to honour this most delicious of spreads. Try this recipe for No Bake Nutella Cookies. This recipe makes 30 cookies. Get an adult to help you.



200g granulated sugar	25g cocoa powder
120g milk	115g butter
1 tsp vanilla extract	pinch of salt
25g peanut butter	25g Nutella
300g oats	

1. Over medium heat, cook sugar, cocoa, milk and butter. Bring to a boil, and boil one full minute.
2. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla, salt, peanut butter, Nutella and oats. Stir until combined.
3. Drop by teaspoon on parchment paper and allow to set, about 15-30 minutes. You can refrigerate them to speed up the setting.

GLASGOW'S GETTING READY



The 2026 Commonwealth Games, officially known as the XXIII (23rd) Commonwealth Games, will be held in Glasgow, Scotland, from July 23 to August 2, 2026. Glasgow agreed to rescue the Games after Victoria in Australia said they could not afford to run them. Glasgow hosted the Games very successfully in 2014 so we're in a position to use that experience to offer a smaller version of the Games. Despite that, it's expected that 3000 athletes from 74 countries and territories will be coming to compete in 10 sports and 6 para sports.

The last time the Games were in Glasgow, one of its biggest successes was the warm welcome given competitors and people attending the games. So, let's make sure we do that again, cheer on everyone taking part (especially Scotland) and that the sun shines. Tickets are on sale.

SCOTLAND'S IN THE WORLD CUP!

Another sporting event in 2026 is football. The biggest ever men's football World Cup takes place in North America in 2026. 48 nations will compete against each other at football stadiums in Canada, Mexico and the United States and the big news is that Scotland will be there. The team kicks off against Haiti on Sunday, June 14th, followed by Brazil on Wednesday and Morocco on Friday. The Tartan Army are very excited as Scotland has not played in World Cup at this level since 1998. Even the Scottish Government are excited and thinking of declaring a holiday for everyone on Monday 15th June to celebrate Scotland being there which means a day off school!



A VALENTINE'S DAY LEGEND



A long time ago in Rome, an emperor banned marriage. St. Valentine was a priest who secretly married couples because he believed love was important. While in prison, he befriended the jailer's daughter, who was blind. He prayed for her, and she miraculously got her sight back. Before he died, he wrote her a letter, signing it "Your Valentine," and she could read it because her sight was restored. This story inspired people to celebrate love and kindness on February 14th.

Legacy Project

Since the last update in the December Good Neighbour, the builders have been very busy despite some atrocious weather during December and January.

Towards the end of November, acoustic panelling was fitted to the ceiling of all spaces in the annexe. These panels reduce the echo and reverberation that can happen when sounds bounce around a large building from hard surfaces. The panels give much improved clarity of sound especially the spoken word in potentially noisy settings. This was a feature recommended by the architect based on their experience elsewhere.

The underfloor heating was installed and just before the builders broke up for the Christmas holiday, they were able to pour the screed. This is a cement type mixture applied as a levelling layer to create a smooth flat surface for the final floor covering. The holiday period gave the screed the necessary time to settle and "cure" so that when they started back at the beginning of January work could continue inside the building.

As those who pass the building regularly will have seen, the roof is now completely in place and on one surface we can see the fixings for solar panels that will be installed to help keep our energy costs as low as possible. The heating inside the annexe itself will be provided by an air source heat pump and we were successful in securing a grant to meet a significant part of that cost. The heat pump and the solar panels all contribute to our aim of making this building as sustainable and as "green" as we possibly can.

More recently the window frames and glass have now been installed and much of the external brickwork completed. We are now beginning to see the external appearance much more clearly.

With the roof and windows now in place attention is turning to the internal specification of the annexe. The architect takes the lead on this and suggests various colours and fittings for our approval. You may remember that in 2024 when we first began to think about what the building would look like inside, we formed a much wider group than the current Legacy Group to look at this on our behalf. That group represented different aspects of Church life and of course different ages and interests to ensure that we ended up with a building that was fit for purpose. More recently the architect has been narrowing down the range of options for us and the following images give an idea of what some of the inside will look like.

This image shows the multipurpose space and you can see clearly the corner window that is now in place giving plenty of light to that part of the building and also, we hope showing to those outside that this is an active building with lots of things happening inside.



This image shows the main hall with its badminton court and again you can see all the windows down the left-hand side that are now in place.

This final image is of the entrance area. To the right is the entrance door that is at the end of the new road from Mansefield Road and just to the left of that you will see the kitchen with its servery and to the left the doors into the sanctuary.

The internal fitting out will now continue over February and March and subject to everything going according to plan, the building should be complete by the end of March, early April.

It has certainly been a long road since the Kirk Session decided all those years ago to address the many issues that faced us with our property at that time. We can now finally begin to see everything taking shape and producing what we believe will create a sustainable worshipping congregation in our community for many, many years to come.
